



Stories, your stories?



13 Months of Glory for a Lifetime of Pain: True Story of a Florida Boy



A book review by Tom Thiel:

I first met Don Perrin at the 2010 St. Augustine mini-reunion. He said something about writing a book. I forgot about it. At this year's reunion, Don had the book, and a copy of a professional reviewer's news release recommending the book. I came home and read the whole book, at one setting.

Don wrote it just like he talks—directly and forcefully. Like one man who has seen mortal combat to another.

Consider, for example: "I don't know how many times I've gotten to a patient that there was no way I could save him.

I always pulled his bandage off his belt, ripped it out, put the bandage on so he couldn't see. I would light a cigarette and put it in his mouth and say, 'You lucky bastard. You're going home.' If he was able to talk, he would usually say, 'No shit, doc?' I would say, 'Yep, all the way.' We were both thinking of different places.

When he would die, I would take

the cigarette out of his mouth and put it in mine. I felt he was part of me. I swore I would never quit smoking because I might lose him, but that never happened. In 1988, I had to give up smoking, and I was always afraid they would be gone, but they are still with me in my heart and my soul.

The worst part of all this was if he was a good buddy, it was all I could do not to cry. But you can't linger."

Don's story was riveting to me. I'm sure it will be to you also, and have no hesitation in recommending it to you.
