Woodie, enough! But Thank You!



"Reactionary!" by Lloyd Pate, K 19th/24th POW by Tom Thiel

(K Co, 19th Reg., 24th Div.) book "Reactionary!" as told called stubborn students but latto B. J. Cutler. It is a story about how the Communist Chinese tried to control their Prisoners of War. It is gut wrenching in the brutality of the captors and some of the prisoners.

Pate says that the American prisoners divided into three groups.

"There were the men who went along with the Chinese and agreed with everything they had to say. They stood up and public- lagher take the same man and ly denounced their country, their toss him in the frigid outdoors, government, all that America stood for, and their God. The Chinese called these men peace fighters and later they became known as progressives."

"The largest group was inbetween. These men were on the fence and didn't know which way to go. The Chinese got most of their information about what went on in the camp from this group. Not all of these men were bad. They had some damn good men in there, but some of them would denounce the Chinese to your face and sell you out behind your back."

"Then there was the third group made up of men who were strictly against the Chinese-anything

ecently I read Lloyd Pate's they said and anything they did. In the beginning these men were or if he is now. Pate passed away er the Chinese said they were reactionaries."

> Pate was, of course a reactionary.

A man by the name of Gallagher was a constant antagonist of Pate, who tells of when he arrived at the camp, seeing Gallagher hang a helpless youth on a peg in the wall of their quarters. And then later seeing Galwhere he died. And this had happened previously!

Pate promised to one day to see to it "... that the man who had killed him would pay for it."

He and Gallagher were in conflict almost until they go home.

He later recounts how he provided the compelling testimony in the US's case against Gallagher who by then was seen as a hero.

Gallagher is convicted and Pate tells of how he felt after the trial.

This led me to research Pate's story, especially Gallagher.

Surprisingly, there is quite a lot of material via Google. Gallagher was convicted and given a long

sentence. I do not know where March 20, 2013.

There were a number of films of that era about POWs; one was "The Rack" with Paul Newman as a Captain. I was able to find a trailer of "The Rack;" in it Newman says he served with the 24th Infantry Division.

All this occupied more of my time than I should have expended, but I find the POW books I have read extremely compelling.

How can humans so badly mistreat fellow humans? The death rate for prisoners in the Korean War was something like 43 percent; by contrast in Vietnam it was in the teens.

Pate's book, revised, is available on Amazon from 3rd party vendors for from \$8 to \$28. If you would like to read it, I can provide it to you in PDF format and you can read it on your computer. That way you can enlarge it (for old eyes).

The Rack is available from Amazon for just under \$15.00. They create a one off DVD film when you order it, I chose to not get it, but still may. TJT

On our 8,000 MIAs still in Korea by Tom Thiel



Recently my good friend
Ted Morford, Captain, Retired,
initiated a line of inquiry about
whether recently identified remains from the Korean War
were newly-obtained from North
Korea, or if these were identified
from the relatively few remains
that had been returned many
years ago and placed in storage
in Hawaii.

Ted's letter, which appeared in Graybeards, the Korea War Veterans Association journal, was not directly answered, but Editor Sharp suggested that we focus on our elected representative's failure to respond to our letters. (See Graybeards, Mar-Apr 2015, Morford, "Do We Have Current Access To MIAs?", pg. 62.)

Ted is driven to bring home his youthful very close friend, Corporal Robert S. (Floogie) Manier,

"G" Company, 21st Inf Regt, Native Tennessean, Died in Captivity (POW), July 5, 1951 North Korea, Never Recovered. (from a memorial placed in KWV Dept. FL 2015 Reunion Book by Ted).

Ted's letter led me to ask "What is my Association, The KWVA, doing to aid in returning Floogie and the other 8,000 still there in North Korea?

I did extensive research of KWVA's website, www.kwva.org/, and of 7,234 pages of Graybeards from 2000 the present issue.

I could find no evidence that KWV either had a Policy on POW/MIA or had done anything to hasten their return. (Also, see Graybeards, May-June 2015, Thiel, "What is the KWVA Policy On?, pg. 64-65.)

When the Korean War ended on July 27, 1953; our POW's came home to a mixed reception.

But, some 8,000 of their and our lost brothers were left behind!

Almost all were left in the shallow graves they were relegated to because their living brothers had barely the strength to scrape indentations in the frozen and rocky North Korean soil. For the most part they are still there today, and we need to do what we can to bring them home.

So, what can we do?:

- A) Remember them at the outset of each Member Meeting with an appropriate remembrance. One that is used by KWV CID169 that is patterned after the American Legion is suggested at http://cid169.kwva.org/POW-MIA/01 pow mia.htm
- B) Remember them annually, on the third Friday of September each year, known in the United States as National POW/MIA Recognition Day, by attending or perhaps sponsoring a ceremony at an appropriate memorial.
- C) Regularly write letters or make phone calls to all of the U.S. Senators and Representatives in our area asking them what they are doing to foster the return and identification of these lost brothers. Invite each of these Members of Congress to come to our meetings to explain what they are doing in this and in other matters.
- D) Make the public aware that 8,000 of America's bravest still lie silently in North Korea.

One thing we can do in this re-

gard is actively endorse the proposal initiated by William "Bill" Allen to have a permanent POW/ MIA Forever stamp issued.

Who was Bill Allen and what is his Forever Stamp bill?

Bill of course was a friend of ours; 24th Infantry Division, Charlie Company, 19th Regiment, and KWV in Tampa. He spent nearly three years in various POW prison camps.

I'm sorry to say that Bill passed away of lymphoma December 2014! But his Bill lives on!

Bill wanted to have the Post Office issue a Forever Stamp so that the POW/MIA symbol is seen by the public more often.

He was able to convince his Congressman Gus Bilirakis, FL 12th District, to introduce a bill, HR2794, mandating said Forever Stamp, which he did in 2013.

HR2794 directs the U.S.P.O. to issue a permanent POW/MIA Forever stamp. The bill has many co-sponsors, including Congressman Webster, who told me last summer that the bill was alive and continuing ahead.

But, in a recent phone call to Congressman Bilirakis' New Port Richey office, I was advised that the bill is still in the United States House Committee on Oversight and Government Reform.

The person I spoke with there was excited over our interest in the bill, and suggested we write to congressman Bilirakis.

So that likely will be one of the my first steps.

I then Googled "United States House Committee on Oversight and Government Reform," and got the following information.

Jason Chaffetz, (R) Utah, is Chairman; Elijah Cummings, (D) Maryland, is Ranking Member.

John Mica, and Ron DeSantis, both (R) and both Florida are members; there are no minority members from Florida.

There is a subcommittee on Government Operations, John Mica (R-FL) and Gerry Connolly (D-VA) are the ranking members.

I plan to draft letter (s) to try to find out the status of HR2794, and what we can do to hasten its passage. I will probably write letters to Congressmen Bilirakis, Chaffetz, Mica, DeSantis, Webster and Nugent, and to Senators Rubio and Nelson.

I think it appropriate for each of you to do likewise; include your congressman. If you would like copies of my draft when it is finished just let me know.

E) But there is strength (political) in numbers. So, we should petition the 24th Association to become active in this effort, after all nearly a quarter of the 8,000 came from our Division!

As former Taro Leaf Editor, and Webmaster, I know pretty much what the 24th Infantry Division Association has done.

I can safely say that it has never published a POW/MIA Policy statement, had a POW.MIA Committee, and that all I know that it has done was initiated by a non-member, Merry Helm, when she was Association Historian! And Past President Mel Frederick paid to publish that because the Association objected!

The Association should develop and publicize a strong POW/MIA Policy. Through the Taro Leaf, it should encourage all 1,700 or so members to each write letters to their Congresspersons and Senators.

Our Association should join with other Associations in a joint effort to bring our lost brothers home, where they can be identified and returned to their families for proper burial and closure.

We all have work to do! TJT


