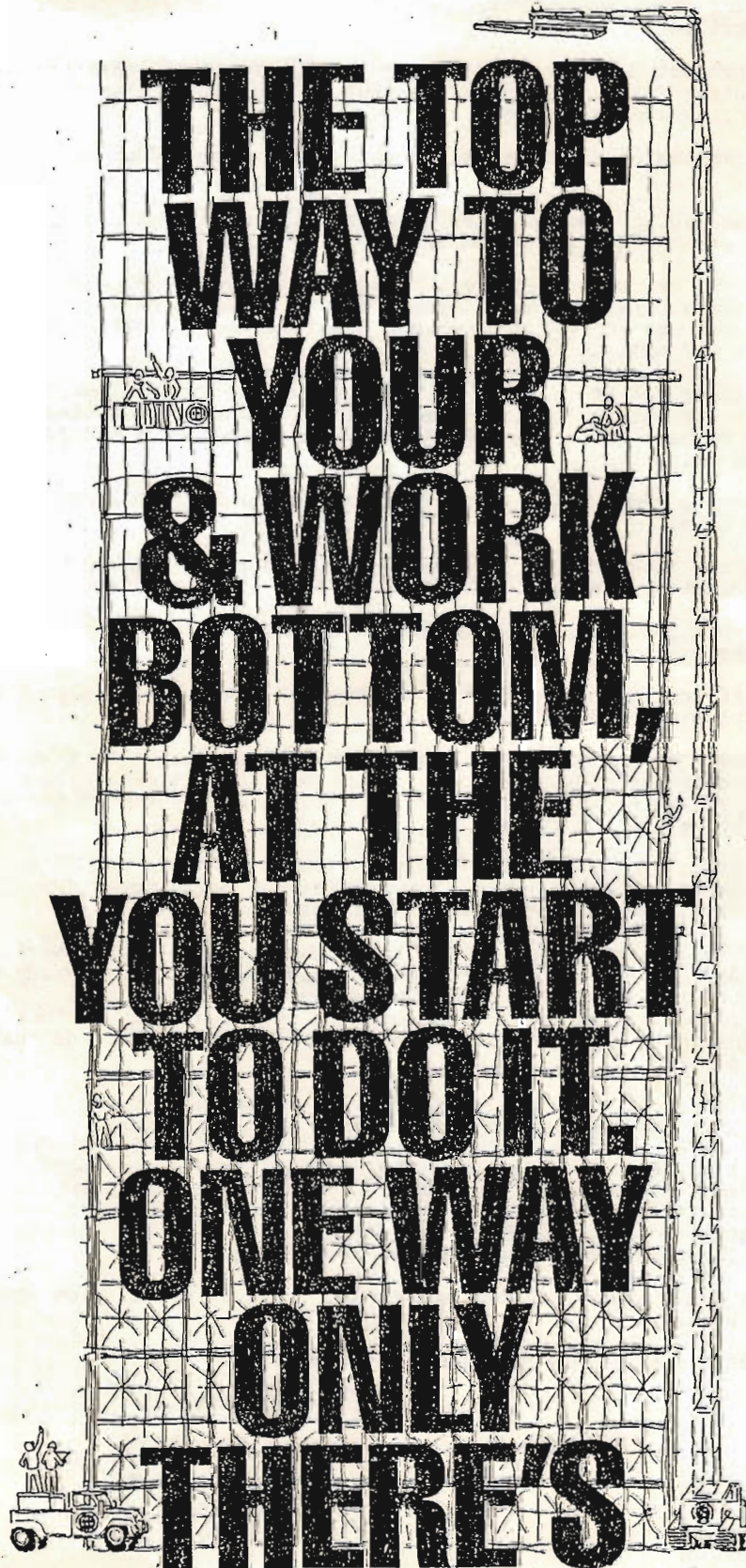

HISTORIAN'S REPORT

A long time ago a concept developed - that the publishing of a History of the Division would generate interest in the Association and give it growth. Initially, the book was to be autobiographical in style, ergo its title - "An Autobiography of a Division" - with each Association member contributing thereto. That plan led only to disaster from the standpoint of the contributions - quantitywise and qualitywise.

As a matter of fact, real support of the project even as of today is far from encouraging. Only 700 plus of our 2100 membership have subscribed.

The project has proceeded slowly - not because of lassitude. To the contrary, the real enthusiasm for same has been with the one doing the pick and shovel work.

The impetus continues to be forward - but the product is not yet ready.

A year ago, there was every hope and wish that we could distribute the books at the '87 Convention site.

In fact, overtures made by a publishing house during last winter to undertake such a job in our behalf only spurred us on with the argument that our way was cheaper and tightened our resolve to meet the summer '87 target.

But it is not to be - and not for the reason that we haven't tried - but rather for the reason that the majority of the other duties attendant to helping to keep the Association afloat have seemed to us to take priority.

Something had to give - there are simply not enough hours in the day to do it all.

Thus the book project is over on a slow burner - with a hopeful completion date of January 1, 1988, less than 5 months hence.

For your patience, your understanding and your financial support, deep thanks.

And if you haven't supported the project financially, then the very question is academic.

During the last 12 months, some 6 or 7 have written in expressing dissatisfaction or disappointment in some degree. In each case we have politely refunded the monetary contribution. It seemed the only fair way to handle the matter.

One solution toward finalization of the project is possible and that is for us to withdraw from earning our daily bread for about 30 days, go into seclusion, and finish it.


There's a bit of irony in the fact that the idea of the book was ours ab initio. We conceived it and had (and yet have) every intention of finishing it - all voluntarily. The bitter pill appears in the form of the few who seem to have the attitude that we are under a long overdue contractual commitment to conclude that which we started.

We ask only for an understanding that we are already well occupied, not only in the work of the Taro Leaf (an almost Herculean effort by itself) but also in the work of administering the operation, taking in its receipts, making its disbursements, showing compassion for the bereaved, babysitting for the sick and the wounded, responding to the unbelievable inquiries which run the whole gamut from A to Z and beyond, etc., etc. - all in a bona fide effort to keep this organization from foundering.

This association has been my family, my love, my life for some 38 - 39 years.

I solicit only your continued patience with me now.

MINUTES OF THE 39th ANNUAL MEETING

The 39th Annual Meeting of the members of the 24th Infantry Division Association was convened at 10:20 a.m., 16 August 1986 by President Richard Watson at the Holiday Inn Crowne Plaza, Los Angeles, California.

President Watson called upon Joseph I. Peyton, Chaplain, for the opening prayer.

Next was the reading of the minutes of the last meeting by the Secretary, Kenwood Ross. On motion duly made and seconded, the minutes were accepted as read.

The next order of business was calling upon the Auditing Committee for its report. The Committee reported that "all was in order and it was very easy to audit the figures." The motion made and seconded to accept the report. So voted.

The President then called on Kenwood Ross, Treasurer, to make his annual report. There being no questions, on motion duly made and seconded, the Treasurer's Report was accepted as read.

One unidentified member suggested that the money in the treasury be spent before all of the present members had died.

Ross replied that the greater portion of the treasury has already been allocated for the printing of the History.

Ross then reported as Editor of the Taro Leaf.

Ross next reported on the progress of the Division History offering to withdraw if the temp of the ongoing work was not satisfactory; not only withdraw but refund all monies contributed toward the project. There followed considerable shouting, foot pounding, table banging, finally terminating in applause for Ross.

Tom Compere then reported on the Life Membership program.

Membership Chairman Lee List next reported on obtaining 58 new members during the year, 11 of whom became life members. Also reported was that 13 members had died during the year plus 45 dropped for failure to pay dues showing 58 plus and 58 minus representing a net gain of zero. List was applauded.

President Watson and President-Elect Avery had to leave for a meeting at City Hall with the Mayor. Secretary Ross took over.

Robert Ender, Convention Chairman, reported 212 members registered in as of the moment.

After considerable foreplay, Robert Ender made a presentation of a beautiful set of briefcases to Secretary-Treasurer-Editor-Historian Ross on behalf of the membership.

Bill Sanderson, Chairman, spoke for the Nominating Committee and submitted the following slate of candidates for office during 1986-87:

Vice President, Lt.Gen.Donald Rosenblum
Chaplain, Joseph I. Peyton

James O'Donnell moved that the report be accepted and the proposed names be placed in nomination. The President Pro temp invited other nominations. There being no other nominations, the Secretary was directed to cast one ballot for the nominated officers and so acted. The President Pro temp declared the slate to be properly elected.

James "Spike" O'Donnell made his annual contribution with reference to the Treasurer which was excitedly "boo"ed with laughter and derision.

The chair recognized the presence of Generals Rosenblum, Newman, Zierath and Wheeler and expressed regret at the inability of Gen. Irving to be with us for this weekend. The chair also recognized Vicente Sydliongco from Leyte, and the ailing Jim Erwin.

The next order of business was the selection of the 1987 convention site.

Robert Ender expressed surprise and dismay that we were proceeding without more advance planning, or "homework" so-called, relative to next year's site. He argued that we go through this lack of advance planning almost every year.

Bill Muldoon reported as Chairman of the Time and Place Committee and presented the site, Chicago, in nomination.




A penultimate comment -

THE WILLIAM JORDAN VERBECK AWARD

Over 20 years ago, this award was decided upon.

Past president Edmond F. Henry spoke concerning it at an Association meeting at that time, saying:

"The late Major General William Jordan Verbeck, onetime regimental commander of the 21st Infantry and onetime Division Chief of Staff, demonstrated in myriad ways - and consistently, from his Division days of '44 and '45 to the day of his death on November 4, 1965 - an unparalleled love for and devotion to Division. It was an obsession with him, a magnificent one.

"It is this enthusiasm, this spirit, which the Executive Committee has sought to memorialize. Hard in the conviction that any honor bearing the name of this beloved comrade-in-arms will carry its own ready acknowledgement of that for which it stands, the Committee was firm that it should be known merely as the 'William Jordan Verbeck Award'. The name 'Verbeck' is synonymous with 'Excellence' in many areas and for many things, but to Taro Leafers particularly, the name represents special excellence in all matters germane to the 24th Infantry Division and its appurtenant parts.

"Bill Verbeck was laid to rest in Arlington National Cemetery. He was loved and admired by everyone who knew him, and especially worshipped by those Gimlets who were and are proud to say 'I served with Colonel Bill Verbeck'. He was truly an ideal soldier, gallant in action, with a rare gift for leadership, yet with a common touch that endeared him to us all. He died, mourned as few men are mourned, because like Bayard, that model of brightly virtue, he could be truly called 'Without fear; and without fault'.

"General Verbeck loved the 24th Infantry Division; and was devoted to this Association, which he served as President during the last year of his life.

"An award bearing his name would be an inspiration to each of us and a source of constant pride to the member who receives it. Your Executive Committee has accepted the offer of one of our number to donate to the Association a symbol of that award and has resolved that the award shall be made to that member who, by his service to the Association, best exemplifies the ideals of General Verbeck. The award is intended to set a high standard. The William Jordan Verbeck Award will be given only sparingly on the vote of the Executive Committee and all because of the unusual quality of performance required to earn it.

"It is and ever shall be the highest honor which our Association can bestow.

"The symbol of the award, this bowl, shall pass from one honoree to the next, with a miniature thereof being given for the permanent possession of each recipient."
