

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Our Constitution must change with our changing times, and for this and other reasons, it was voted at the 1958 Convention to make these necessary revisions. Many of you are not familiar with the present provisions, so the original Constitution is reproduced below for your information. The revisions and additions together with an explanation of same will be printed in a future issue.



CONSTITUTION

24TH INFANTRY (VICTORY) DIVISION VETERANS' ASSOCIATION
PREAMBLE

We, the members of the 24th Infantry (Victory) Division, to nurture the spirit of comradeship among the living, and to perpetuate the memory of those who gave their lives to secure the cause of freedom, do hereby ordain and establish this Constitution.

ARTICLE I
This organization shall be known as the "24th INFANTRY
(VICTORY) DIVISION VETERANS' ASSOCIATION", and shall hereinafter in this instrument be referred to as the "Association."

### ARTICLE II

The purpose of the Association shall be as follows:

- 1. To preserve the memories and friendships common to the veterans of the Division.
- 2. To establish suitable memorials to those members of the Division who gave their lives during World War II.
- 3. To give immediate assistance of a temporary nature to needy veterans of the Division, their wives and immediate familles.
- 4. To publish such histories as will record the accomplishments of the Division during World War II.
- 5. To maintain an information service concerning all members of the  ${\tt Association}.$

# ARTICLE III.

Section 1. Any officer, warrant officer, or enlisted man who is serving with, or has honorably served, the Division between the dates of 7 December 1941 and a date to be announced by the Executive Board, shall be eligible to membership in this Association. Until such time as a member shall become affiliated with a Chapter, he shall be considered a member-at-large; thereafter a chapter member. Members who join the Association prior to the first Annual Convention shall be deemed chartermembers and shall enjoy the distinction of having assisted in the sponsorship of the Association, but shall have no greater privileges than those who join subsequently. Other than the Honorary Presidents hereinafter provided for, there shall be no other honorary officers, and no honorary memberships conferred upon anyone.

Section 2. Any member of the American Red Cross assigned to the Division during the dates set out in the preceding section may become a member of the Association with full privileges, except that such members will be designated as associate members.

# ARTICLE IV

Section 1. All commanding generals of the 24th Infantry Division are designated as Honorary Presidents.

Section 2. Officers of the Association shall be elected for the term of one year, by a majority of the votes cast at the Annual Convention and shall serve without compensation, except that the Annual Convention may provide compensation for the Secretary-Treasurer. The Association shall have the following officers:

- a. A President.
- b. Ten Vice-Presidents one from each Corps Area and one from the Hawaiian Department.
- c. A Secretary-Treasurer.

Section 3. The President shall appoint such temporary committees as he deems necessary, and shall be an ex-officio member of each. He shall preside at the Annual Convention, shall represent the Association before the public, and shall generally perform the duties usually incumbent on such an officer.

Section 4. In the event of the death or resignation of the President, the Vice-Presidents small select one from among their number to perform the duties of the President. Each Vice-President small be in charge of the organization of Chapters within his area.

Section 5. It shall be the duty of the Secretary-Treasurer to prepare and maintain records of the membership of the Association, as well as the last known addresses of the veterans of the Division. He shall carry on the correspondence of the Association, compile historical data as to the Division and its veterans, and maintain liaison with other veterans' associations. He shall keep the minutes of the Annual Convention, the Executive Board, and any other committee of which he is a member, and shall be the custodian of the Constitution and all other documents. In addition thereto, he shall collect, hold, and disburse all funds of the Association, and keep records of the same in the form to be prescribed by the Executive Board. His accounts shall be subject to an annual audit by the Auditing Committee, and he shall obtain a bond in the penal sum to be determined by the Executive Board. He shall make no expenditures or incur any obligations except as hereinafter authorized. Special funds which may be created for memorials, publications, and welfare shall be maintained separately from the general funds of the Association to be expended only for the purposes created but otherwise controlled in the same manner as prescribed for general funds. In general, the Secretary-Treasurer shall assume all the duties incumbent on the secretarial and fiscal offices.

### ARTICLE V

Section 1. The governing body of this Association small be the Annual Convention. Any member in good standing shall have the right to be a delegate until twenty-five (25) Chapters shall have been organized. Upon being organized, each Chapter may send two delegates to the Annual Convention. The first Annual Convention small meet at the date and place determined by the temporary presidents as provided in Article VIII. Thereafter, and until such time as World War II may be formally declared ended, the Annual Convention small meet at such place as the Executive Board determines and on Organization Day (1 October). Subsequent to the formal declaration of the end of the war, it shall be neld in conjunction with the annual convention of any such national veterans' organization as the Executive Board may decide.

Section 2. The Annual Convention shall determine the qualifications of the delegates thereto, receive reports from the officers of the Association and the various committees, elect officers for the ensuing year, adopt policies and take such actions as are germaine to the purposes of which the Association was formed. The Annual Convention may arend this Constitution by a vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the delegates present, but a vote of the majority of the delegates present shall be sufficient for the election of officers, the enactment and amendment of By-Laws, and for any other matters that may be properly brought before it.

Section 3. Fifteen (15) members-at-large may apply to the Executive Board to organize a Chapter along geographical lines, which Chapter may adopt a constitution and by-laws, not at variance with those of the Association. Several Chapters may form a Department, also along geographical lines, with such privileges as the Annual Convention may decide.

# ARTICLE VI.

Section 1. There shall be an Executive Board consisting of the duly elected officers of the Association, and the past president of the Association. It shall be the governing body of the Association between meetings of the Annual Convention, and shall assume such authority as is accorded to it by this Constitution and as may be expressly delegated to it by the Annual Convention. The Executive Board shall meet at the call of the President of the Association, who shall also be the chairman, but it may authorize the transaction of business and the voting by mail, within its discretion. The Executive Board shall supervise the work of the Standing Committees, pass on applications of the establishment of Chapters, supervise the expenditure of the funds of the Association insofar as the right to do so may be delegated to it in the Annual Convention, and serve as the advisory body to the President.

Section 2. The Executive Board shall appoint the following Standing Committees of five (5) members each, two (2) members to serve three (3) years each, two (2) members to serve two (2) years each, and one (1) member to serve one (1) year, responstments being for a term of three (3) years. Members of these Committees shall not be members of the Executive Committee.

a. Committee on Publications: This committee will prepare and publish for the Association such histories or other publications, including a bulletin, as may be authorized by the Annual Convention or the Executive Committee.

b. Crumittee on Memorials: This committee will prepare and execute plans for such memorials as may be duly authorized by the Annual Convention or the Executive Committee.

- c. Committee on Relief: This committee shall receive and take action on all requests for the relief of needy veterans of this Division, their wives, and immediate families. Such relief shall be temporary in character and shall only be made while an application for relief from some governmental agency is pending or in event such application has been denied. This committee shall render all assistance in its power to secure for veterans of the Division such relief as may be authorized by the Federal Government, or by any other agency. by the Federal Government, or by any other agency.
- d. There shall be an Auditing Committee with the duty to make an annual audit of the accounts of the Secretary-Trassurer and such other audits as may be desirable. The Annual audit shall be completed prior to the Annual Convention and report made thereon.

### ARTICLE VII

Section 1. The Annual dues in the Association shall be two (\$2.00) dollars, payable on application for membership and thereafter on a date to be announced by the Executive Board. Chapters may determine the dues for their Chapter-Members subject to the approval of the Executive Board, but they shall remit to the Association one dollar (\$1.00) annually for each

Section 2. The President shall submit a budget to the Annual Convention which shall have the sole authority to authorize dis-bursement of the funds of the Association.

### ARTICLE VIII

Section 1. It being apparent that many of the provisions of this Constitution cannot, by their terms, become effective until implemented by the Annual Convention, the following Sections of this Article will take precedence over any contrary sections or Articles, until the Annual Convention shall have met.

Section 2. A majority vote, of those present, of the representatives of the units of the Division (19th, 21st, and 34th Infantry; 11th, 13th, 52nd and 63rd Field Artillery Battalions; 24th Medical Battalion; and Special Troops), duly appointed to form this Association, shall be sufficient to ratify or amend this Constitution, and thereafter it shall be considered valid for all purposes. for all purposes

Section 3. The representatives as described in Section 2, or Section 3. The representatives as described in Section 2, or their similarly appointed successors, shall have the right be majority vote to elect temporary officers who shall serve without compensation but only until offocers shall be elected by the Annual Convention as hitherto provided in this Constitution. The temporary officers shall consist of a President, 3 Vice-Presidents, and Secretary-Treusurer. The President shall call periodic meetings of the representatives as the occasion arises, and preside at the same, but may in his discretion delegate his authority to preside; he shall appoint all committees as he deems necessary and be, ex-officio, a member thereof; he shall issue a call to an Annual Convention at the earliest possible date; and he shall discharge all the customary duties of his office. In the event of the inability or disinclination of the office. In the event of the inability or disinclination of the President to serve, the Vice-Presidents shall select one from among their number to perform the duties of the President. The Secretary-Treasurer shall immediately accept applications for membership in the Association on the basis of the eligibility set forth in Article III; he shall have custody of all funds, records, and documents of the Association; he shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the representatives and of all committees of which he shall be an ex-officio member; he shall

generally undertake the usual duties of the secretarial and fiscal offices. All temporary officers shall take immediate steps to publicize the Association through appropriate agencies and snall continually foster interest and disseminate information relating to it.

Section 4. No officer under this Article shall have the right to disburse funds of the Association, or incur any obligations, except as previously authorized by a vote of two-thirds (2/3rds) of the representatives at a meeting expressly called for that purpose, and then only for such expenditures as may be necessary to increase the membership of the Associa-tion and arrange for the meeting of the Annual Convention. The Secretary-Treasurer may, however, without any prior authoriza-tion disburse funds for postage and necessary incidentals to publicize the Association.

Ratified, in substance, on 29 November 1945 at Matsuyama, Shikoku, Japan, by representatives of organic units of 24th Infantry Division, met for that purpose.

The 34th came into being as a result of the rweeping National Defense Act of 1918. It was first organized on July 13, 1918, at El Paso, Texas. The initial assignment included duty along the Mexican border and training of National Guard units.

The 34th sailed for France with

the Seventh Division in 1918, and fought in the Fuvenelle-sector with great valor. For this and subsequent

Tuesday of this week marks the | 24th Division's rapid thrust across the Island, the Regiment remain ed in constant combat with the enemy for 75 consecutive days.

Attached to the 38th Division near Subic Bay, the 34th fought bitter action to retake Bataan. The 34th went on to dig the Japanese out of

went on to dig the Japanese out of holes in Corregidor and rejoined the 24th Division to help Mindapao. In the early days of Korean fight-ing the 34th bore the brunt of the overwhelming Communist Assaults. Severely reduced in strength the 34th was transferred back to Japan on paper, to be stationed at Zame and Fuji in Honshu.

Returning to Kores, the 34th was ordered to process POWs and later set up Headquarters in Pusan. In 1994 the 34th rejoined the 24th Division where it spent over a year mandles the destination of the 1994 the set of the 1994 the set of the 1994 th great valor. For this and subsequent actions against the Germans the actions against the Germans the 34th was cited by the French with the battle honors of Lorraine.

On December 7, 1941, the 34th was preparing to move to the Philippines, but the Pearl Harbor attack changed this and the Regiment suited for Ilawali instead.
