and urge all citizens to join in this tribute to the fighting organization of World War II, Korea and the Middle East during their reunion in Philadelphia.

Our Guest of Honor, General Bryan formerly commanded the 24th Division in Korea, from January 1951 until December 1951.

Since August 1957, he has been in command of the First U. S. Army at Governors Island, N. Y., and was appointed Chairman, U.S. Military Delegation Military Staff Committee, United Nations, and Senior U. S. Army Representative to the Military Staff Committee of the United Nations.

General Bryan will no doubt discuss experiences encountered during the Korean war. We trust that Mrs. Bryan will be with us also.

So it is with great anxiety that we again approach the time of our annual reunion, when we can get together to renew old friendships. The members of the Association still share today that deep comradeship they shared during those years of conflict. We are proud to have served in this illustrious Division and also we can be justly proud of its achievements in the defense of our Country.

In addition to the serious side of the Convention, which includes the beautiful Memorial Service, you will have plenty of interesting things to do. 24th Division Combat films will be shown several times each day. -- the TROPHY ROOM will be open at all times. 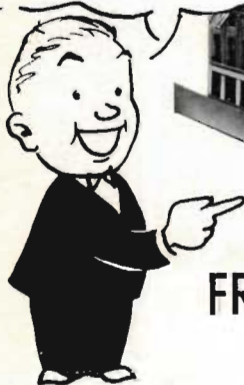

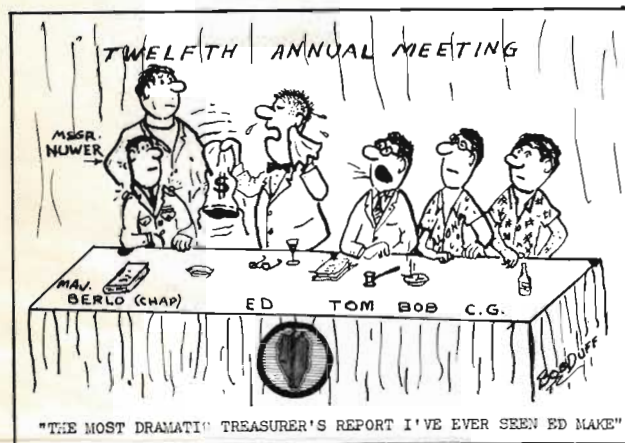

RESERVE ARMORY NAMED FOR BOB CHAPMAN OF "CHICKS"

The new Army Reserve Armory recently completed in Danville, Illinois, has been named the ROBERT BENJAMIN CHAPMAN ARMY RESERVE CENTER, after one of Danville's most illustrious war heroes. Lt. Col. Melvin C. O'Donnell, (21st), area commander, made the announcement recently.

CAPT. ROBERT B. CHAPMAN, Service Company, 19th, was killed 25 June 1945, near Tamagan, Mindanao, Philippines. On this date, on an assault against the enemy, Bob was with COL. "JOCK" CLIFFORD. Jock was struck down under enemy bombardment, and Bob rushed to his side. At that moment another shell hit Bob. He died a short time later.

His awards included Silver Star Medal, Bronze Star Medal with three Oak Leaf Clusters, the Purple Heart with one Oak Leaf Cluster.

Robert B. Chapman was born in Danville Jan. 12, 1921, and lived there until he entered the service in 1939. He served with the 24th Division, from Oahu on through the war. He received the Bronze Star Medal in Dutch New Guinea in 1944 on 7 May for "heroic achievement in combat against the enemy". At Luzon he received two Oak Leaf clusters for leading an untried group of men and capturing an enemy camp. The Silver Star was for his leadership and actions at Tamagan.

Five years after his death, on June 23, 1950, he was awarded a third Oak Leaf Cluster.

Captain Chapman's Mother, Mrs. Agnes M. Chapman resides at 1226 N. Walnut St., Danville, Illinois. His wife Mary and son Robert B. Chapman, Jr. live in Des Moines, Iowa.

A formal dedication ceremony will be held at the Armory on 8 September 1959. A bronze plaque bearing the name with an appropriate narrative, will be permanently attached to the building.

The naming of this beautiful Armory building after Bob Chapman, of the Rock of Chickamauga, makes us all very proud.
